Simon's Plastic Nurdels

Simon Pardoe went nurdle hunting the other day and found these amongst the usual natural debris at the tide line by M&S (bus station).



Nurdels are the raw plastic material from which all those products-we-can't-do-without are made; the reason that we should be concerned is that countless billions of them are used by industry and some escape to rivers and into our seas; thus nurdles are an insidious component of ocean plastic pollution. Simon is holding a selection of waste plastic, amongst which are the nurdles. Simon asks: 'I wonder if we can find out if they come from the river or the sea. Any plastic manufacturers up the Exe river system..?'

I don't know where they come from Simon but I know where they are going. These objects get degraded into smaller particles and can be ingested by marine organisms thus entering the food chain and ultimately into you and me!

This Month's Plastic Action

Exmouth is really stepping up to the mark when it comes to reducing single-use plastics and you can play your part on Saturday November 17 when there are two separate actions taking place. Roll up to talk to the public and persuade our Dictrict and Town Councils to lead the way by eliminating single-use plastics from their own operations.

An action organised on Facebook will take place 14.00-16.00 at Tescos in the Salterton Road where a group will be persuading shoppers to reject plastic packaging. At the same time in the Magnolia Centre we will be doing the same thing, offering in exchange fabric

Local Grants - still open for Projects

A new grant called the Exmouth Community Fund is a trial for Exmouth, replacing the former Parishes Together funding. Details of the fund are currently being ironed out with the deadline for applications to be the 2nd January 2019.

Treeasurer Doreen and I need to receive proposals for your projects. It will be a competitive process, with an Apprentice-style public hearing so your proposals need to be good and your arguments need to stress benefit to the town. Lets get going on this now.

Wild Exmouth

You will remember that earlier in the year, Tim Dafforn of EDDC's Countryside Team made an application to the Heritage Lottery Find for his project Wild Exmouth, Tim has now announced:

'Sorry for the delay in replying. I am pleased to let you know that we have been awarded the Heritage Lottery funding and the project will be starting as soon as we have recruited a Ranger. ... I hope to have the person in role by January at the latest. Exciting times and I look forward to working with you and other members of Transition Exmouth over the coming months.

Tim's job advert has gone out with a press release acknowledging the funders and setting out his 3year plan.

Several members of TrEx are keen to get closely involved so watch this space; Tim's plans depend heavily on volunteer participation so why not commit to what should be a unique and fun opportunity to bring the wild back into Town. RSVP.
