Local zero-waste celebrity Sarah Allen delivered a well thought-out presentation that managed to walk the tightrope between preaching and being informative by simply telling us how she went about filling her black bin only after 6 months (4 in her family!). The key seems to be that one needs to re-programme consumer habits such that after a while it all becomes 2nd nature and life is better. See next heading for more info.

Back to the AGM. you will not be surprised to learn that I am still Chair and Secretary and have taken on several additional duties, not thankfully that of Treasurer; the wonderful Doreen Sandham stepped up to the mark on that one.

Many thanks to Rob Masding who, in addition to several other roles, has been our conscientious Treasurer for the last four years. Rob remains as a member.

Your Umbrella Group now comprises, in addition to Doreen & myself, Andy Lock, Noel Harrower, and Jane Ashton. Cllr Tim Dumper who is our liaison with the Town Council also attends.

The other item that will be of interest to those who are, or are planning to be, members is the yearly subscription. There was a lively debate about the pros & con's of increasing it but we routinely balance on the brink of insolvency and that is not sensible. The increasers eventually carried the day and the following resolution was passed:

'The subscription rate for the next 12 months for both individual members and corporate groups is agreed to be £10 (plus planting a tree) with additional voluntary subscriptions welcome but totally free to those under 18, students, & the unemployed.'

It goes without saying that anyone wanting to join and start their own project is welcome as is anyone wanting to help with the work of the Umbrella.

Sarah's 7Rs

We are all familiar with the 4Rs but here is Sarah's 7Rs take on that mnemonic: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repair, Rot, Recycle, Return.

To be blunt: we all talk about it but Sarah actually does it so take some leaves out of her book. Sarah has agreed to my using her notes so here is the 1st instalment, on REFUSE:

That's what I'd been doing when I started to look for recyclable packaging. It's the main R in tackling rubbish, so top of my list. I refuse all sorts of things now, that previously I would have accepted. Simply put, if you don't need it or want it refuse it! Shopping is the front-line in refusing; as one thing ran out I looked for recyclable options initially but now I try to refuse plastic and packaging

- Shop around
- Plastic-wrapped fruit and veg, (The Farm Shop). Buy loose, put straight into the basket or reusable produce bag
- My Kids have a free choice but I deal with the rubbish further down my R's system
- I still eat cakes, biscuits, chocolate and crisps!

- Cakes and biscuits (un-packaged or homemade)
- Chocolate (foil or foil and cardboard e.g. Green and Blacks, M&S, Smarties, Cadbury's Creme Eggs). Pick and mix in the market.
- Crisps (often an alternative will work e.g. pistachios (from Lidl) or olives but now I also make crisps)
- Unpackaged shops (Nourish and Plastic Free Pantry) I am now able to buy products such as pasta, rice, lentils, dried fruit etc plastic-free or without packaging).
- Refuse Bin liners (I just don't use any), plastic sticky tape (for our own present wrapping; I use paper tape instead), cling film, most conventional cosmetics and toiletries, tea bags wrapped in and containing plastic.

Flood Protection Scheme - trees

As you will be aware, the Environment Agency are about to spend large amounts of money in raising our sea defences against Climate-change related sea-level rises. They have recently lodged a planning application. Remember this is coinciding with the latest IPCC report that tells us how urgent it is to reduce carbon emissions NOW; we won't keep the sea at bay for ever! I couldn't go to the public exhibition but Ian Cann of Exmouth Civic Society, one of our corporate members, did and he has alerted us to one unfortunate detail. Anyway although I can't imaging anyone is against the overall scheme, the proposal is to raise the height of the estuary-side wall behind the railway station and to achieve that, they want to fell the row of trees that top the existing embankment. Google StreetView shows the trees as they were 10 years go and they now seem well-established, mature, and provide a welcome landscape feature in this desolate corner of Exmouth; they are of course providing in themselves a defence against Human-induced Climate Change. I have not yet tunnelled in to the detail of the application to discover whether the contractors intend to plant new saplings somewhere 'in exchange' but in any case we all know the fate of many such new plantings, they don't survive!

Ian Cann's suggestion is that the trees are kept insitu and the new wall is build along the edge of car park. It seems to be a good plan especially considering that it must be easier and cheaper for the contractors to build there (something like the concrete walls that are replacing metal crash barriers down the middle of all our motorways) rather than to re-build the whole embankment. As a property owner in The Colony, obviously I have a vested interest in the scheme going ahead but the wholescale felling of the trees seems to me rather too much like vandalism. why can't we actually agree as a nation to assign a monetry value to trees, it seems to me that much else in the planning system hinges on economic benefit, witness the arguments for the jobs/economic benefit of development on Woodbury Common that we have just witnessed.

In development debates the value of trees is seen as an amenity value or in more enlightened arguments as a climate stabilising/pollution-reduction value but otherwise the only monetary implication of tree felling seems to be the cost of removing them. If roadside British timber had a value that exceeded the cost of removal, we'd have only specimen ones remaining!

So my proposal is that all trees have a value that depended on an age/species/condition calculation and that if felled, the landowner would have to cough up to the public purse.

Environment Interpretation Centre (EIC)

I've told you about Noel's pet project before but do you realise that much work has gone into lobbying for a similar concept in years gone past. The need for something of the sort is prominent in the draft Neighbourhood Plan, and we need to keep the pressure up.

A new twist to the project has been suggested by Jo Slater. The proposal that he has put to Hemingway is in his (edited) words:

'... the proposition is that a study and education centre be set up to explain and explore the weather, the tides and the ecosystem. It will be an education centre in the sense that there will be hands on exhibits such as estuary models simulating tides, computer modeling perhaps for the weather, temporary exhibitions covering such things as hurricanes, weather photography competitions and so on. Agencies such as the Met Office could be in partnership gaining a public arena and increasing public participation. There would of course be many educational links with ongoing research drawing in schools, universities and academics; a place to showcase and discuss climate research.

This is obviously a long term project which will take years to organize, build and fund and no doubt there would be a series of stages, the first being to talk to all possible agencies. The subjects are not covered elsewhere.'

Jo is working with Noel on this and is looking for collaborators so please get in touch if you want to progress this.

Apple Pressing Day

Local Grants

A new grant called the Exmouth Community Fund is a trial for Exmouth, replacing the former Parishes Together funding. Details of the fund are currently being ironed out with the deadline for applications to be the 2nd January 2019. Chetna Jones of the Town Council will be circulating full details very shortly giving us plenty of time to prepare.

At COLP we established that groups such as ours qualify for funding so Doreen and I need to receive proposals for your projects. It will be a competitive process, with what I'm told is an Apprentice-style public hearing (what does that mean?), so your proposals need to be good and your arguments need to stress benefit to the town. Lets get going on this now.

Neighbourhood Plan

The Exmouth Neighbourhood Plan is in a 6 week public consultation at EDDC. Hopefully it can go through to referendum soon.


