The planning application is in and Orcombe Point is going to get a temporary cafe. I suppose EDDC want to see how it goes with a temporary licence before arriving at the ;Final Solution. If you fancy running a cafe get in touch with them soon. Will the opportunity be put out to tender I wonder or has the deal been done already?

I see from his column in the EJ edition of 27 April that Hugo Swire and I have something in common: we both run diesel cars, although unlike Hugo, I don't lay the blame for my situation on the Labour Party!

It is good to see that the Government are going to take the problems of particulate pollution seriously, or a bit seriously; scrappage for my car may well be a good idea and serve to persuade the public that the Government are doing something but consider for a moment that every truck, van, & bus in the country runs on diesel; What are the Government going to do about that, I wonder?

Lets be more constructive however; Hugo likes the idea of more electric vehicles, and states the obvious:

'...which means more charging stations everywhere.'.

That's a grand idea but how many public charging points do we have in Exmouth now? The answer is: NONE, you have to travel to Darts Farm to get this particular need met!

Transition Exmouth is promoting, through the town's developing Neighbourhood Plan, the installation of public charging points for electric vehicles. If electric vehicles become mainstream, as we hope, owners will not be coming here; there is nowhere to charge up. Here is a map of public points:

7. Doughnut Economics to the Rescue

You can't ignore the economy but there is a way through to making our world sustainable. Transition Exmouth will be circulating all our local councillors with George Monbiot's book review, published in the Guardian 12th April 2017: http://www.monbiot.com/2017/04/13/circle-of-life/ Circle of Life.

Doughnut Economics: seven ways to think like a 21st-century economist. By reframing the economy, Kate Raworth's Doughnut Economics changes our view of who we are and where we stand. Kate reminds us that economic growth was not, at first, intended as a measurement of well-being. Simon Kuznets, who standardised the measurement of growth, warned: "the welfare of a nation can scarcely be inferred from a measure of national income." Economic growth, he pointed out, measures only annual flow, rather than stocks of wealth and their distribution. The aim of economic activity, she argues, should be "meeting the needs of all within the means of the planet." Instead of economies that need to grow, whether or not they make us thrive, we need economies that "make us thrive, whether or not they grow." This means changing our picture of what the economy is and how it works.

So say all of us.

Our founder Rob Hopkins recently visited the site of Vincent Van Gogh's 'Yellow house' in Arles France. I have not previously rated Rob as a great writer but he was inspired to give us this motivating comment:

"In this house, Vincent Van Gogh, for six intense, passionate months of his life, painted as though his life depended on it. He imagined this house as a catalyst for a shift of global significance, a reimagining of art and its possibilities. And although the personal cost to him was enormous, he achieved his dream, albeit posthumously. The painting he made of this house still speaks to the power of the human mind to will the seemingly impossible into reality. And to do so with love, colour, passion and beauty. And we need it now more than we ever have".
